Notes for SUSANNA BLODGETT:

The History of Woburn, page 594, in the genealogical notes lists Susanna as the 4th child born to Samuel Blodgett and Ruth Eggleiden, but gives not birth date. It also says that she married a James Simond, but no marriage date. The same History of Wobur, page 27 lists the marriage of a Susanna Blodgett and James Simonds on December 29, 1685, but one does not know who her parents were without looking for her birth certificate and the marriage certificate at the Woburn Town Hall.

Notes for SARAH BLODGETT:

The History of Woburn on page 22 lists Sarah's birth date as February 17, 1668, not 1667.

6. THOMAS⁶ BLODGETT (*SAMUEL⁵, THOMAS⁴, ROBERT³, ROBERT², THOMAS¹ BLOWGATE*) was born 26-February-1660/61 in Woburn, Middlesex County, Massachusetts, and died 29-September-1740. He married REBECCA TIDD 11-November-1685 in Woburn, Middlesex County, Massachusetts, daughter of JOHN TIDD and REBECCA. She was born in Woburn, Middlesex County, Massachusetts.

Notes for THOMAS BLODGETT:

Thomas was born to Samuel Blodgett and Ruth Eggleiden in Woburn February 26, 1661. He married Rebecca Tidd of Woburn, 11 November 1685 and they had 8 children. He was a farmer in Woburn and Lexington. He appears to have been assessed in Woburn from 1684 to 1689, although he removed to Lexington some years earlier. He was a subscriber to the precinct meeting-house, 1692, was first taxed 1694, and settled on the present Adams Street near the so-called Gibbs place. Both he and his wife were admitted to the Lexington church, 05 March 1699, by a letter of dismission from the church at Woburn. At a town meeting held 09 January 1713, he was appointed one of a committee of five to build a new meeting-house. After the town was incorporated, he held the office of Tythingman, and in 1717, was an assessor, and also represented the town in the General Court, 1719, and 1721. He and his family lived on Adams Street, near the intersection of North Street. It is recorded in Hudson's "History of Lexington" that he gave one pound, six shillings towards the first Meeting House, and five shillings towards the purchase of Lexington Common, at a meeting held April 1711. Another meeting, held June 09, 1713, it was voted to build another church on the plan of the one at Concord, and Thomas and two others were appointed to carry out the measure. Thomas was the ancestor of the greater part of the Lexington Blodgetts, and one of the most active and prominent citizens. He died September 29, 1740 His will was dated 26 October 1738 and was probated 24 November 1740.
